

This year's Rotary Technology Tournament saw three teams of dedicated pupils compete against other local schools in both the basic and intermediate levels of the Rotary Technology Tournament. Yet again, another difficult challenge was set where the teams had to design and make a remotely operated vehicle from basic raw materials to travel along a path, go under a bridge and also incorporate a crane that could pick up a load, reverse back and then drop the load in a specified spot. The teams were awarded points for the quality of the design portfolio, teamwork as well as the quality of the build of their model and how successfully it completed the task.

The girls had to draw on all of their previous experience from the extra-curricular Design Technology club, where they have studied a range of engineering principles and concepts and take their problem solving skills and teamwork to a new level.

# **House Update**











This term has been a busy for some of the houses and changes have been afoot. It is with regret that we say farewell to Mrs Clarke who has stepped down as House Leader for Seacole. However, we welcome Ms Gouldbourne who is taking over with immediate effect and very enthusiastically too. She has held her first assembly and already begun planning what exciting things the girls in the house are going to be doing over the coming months.

House assemblies took place recently and certificates and prizes were presented to the champions in each year group, in each house. Hepburn had overall champions in four of the 5-year groups and this is helping them stay close on Pankhurst's heels as they still cling on to first place in the house rankings. At the recent count they have 25,020 points, with a lead of only 418 above Hepburn. Behind in order are Curie, Seacole, Bronte and Keller.

Keller did earn some much-needed points in the Year 7 Inter House Sports on enrichment day recently. They took first place followed by Bronte, Curie, Pankhurst, Seacole and then Hepburn. The girls had their first taste of house sports, busily competing in badminton, netball, hockey, table tennis, dance, bench ball and football.

The house charities are benefiting from the yield of a very active term from several houses. Bronte held an extremely successful sweet tombola and provided a wonderful Mother's Day hamper which was raffled off in time to be enjoyed on the day. So far they have raised £321.19 for the Alzheimer's Society.

Curie have an on-going 50-50 club for staff, with half the money going in prizes and half to their charity; Queenscourt Hospice. Alongside this they have also raffled a girls night in pamper hamper bringing their current sum to £276.75.

Hepburn, along with the staple support of an emergency staff tuck shop, have added to their coffers with another Easter cake sale. Though not as many pupils as usual brought cakes in, it was still a busy sale and raised £101.30, taking their total for UNICEF this year to £452.46.



Pankhurst provided pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and their takings when added up, take their total to £315.09. Any money they raise will be price matched by the Bill Gates Foundation to go to Purple for Polio.

Keller have a popcorn sale planned for after Easter and are also refurbishing the chicken coup ready to inhabit it with some new chickens for the girls to take care of. I am sure fresh egg sales may be something the staff will happily buy, especially when the funds would go to the good cause of Guide Dogs for the Blind.

As for Seacole, watch this space! Ms Gouldbourne is plotting a total overhaul and raising awareness of Mary Seacole's endeavours on the nursing front, including the appointment of Liverpool Women's Hospital as their house charity.

When we return after Easter, there is only one term to go before the winning house adorns the champion's trophy with its own coloured ribbons. Plans are already being made for the winners reward afternoon.
